Frank Thomas Baker, Jr. – known to all who loved him as "Tommy" – passed away at UAB Hospital in Birmingham, Alabama,


with his daughter Erin by his side. He was 76 years old.

Tommy Baker did not become a member of the Montevallo HIstorical Society until 2024, but he became an integral part of our organization and one of our favorite people when he volunteered to participate in the first Wreaths Across America event held at Montevallo City Cemetery in 2022. Every December, Wreaths Across America encourages groups across the United States to unite in honoring veterans buried in local cemeteries by laying special holiday wreaths on their graves. Veterans such as Tommy volunteer to represent the various branches of the American armed forces in a solemn ceremony at the beginning of the event. Tommy was one of eight veterans who came to the cemetery to perform this task. They all then joined everyone else in attendance to lay more that 300 wreaths on veterans graves that had been identified for the honor. Tommy impressed everyone with his formal military bearing, his white gloves and spit-shined shoes, and the dedication and gratitude he exhibited toward each veterans grave he visited. Tommy came back for the event in 2023 and 2024 and we fully expected to be able to count on him for years to come. Sadly, that would not be the case due to his unexpected passing this past spring.
