

## **Klotzman's Department Store**

The Klotzman brothers, Sam and Joe, came to Montevallo from West Blocton and opened a dry goods store in the former C.L. Meroney building in the early 1930's. The Klotzmans were businessmen who had been part of the substantial number of Jewish merchants thriving in West Blocton as a result of the prosperity generated by the nearby coal mines. A similar economic environment had been created in Montevallo from its own mines, just a few miles outside of town, and supplemented by local farmers and the rapidly growing faculty, staff, and student body of Alabama College.

Joe and Sam dissolved their partnership in the 1940's, so Sam, his wife Rose, and within a few years, their son Harry, continued to operate the business until it closed for good in the 1980's. In the early years, the Klotzmans sold traditional mercantile goods but gradually phased out hardware and farm implements to specialize in shoes and ready-to-wear clothing for the entire family.

There is evidence in local newspapers from the 1930's that retail clerks employed by businesses located on Montevallo's Main Street were members of a union organized to represent their interests. It is not known if Klotzman's clerks were union members, but there were certainly other local retailers operating with union labor.

Also, the Klotzmans' religious faith compelled them to close their store for most of the day on some Saturdays to allow them to observe major Jewish holidays.



The Jewish holiday traditions required the faithful to refrain from conducting business on those Saturdays until sundown. To minimize the financial impact of missing a big sales day, and knowing that shoppers from out in the country were in town all day, the Klotzmans and other Jewish merchants advertised in the *Montevallo Times* that they would be closed on Saturday in observance of a religious holiday but would open after sundown and stay open for business until 10:00 pm.
